The Town of Lamont Operating and Capital budget reflects Town Council's continued commitment to support the community during the current challenging and uncertain times due to COVID -19.

COUNCIL PRIORITIES & INVESTMENTS

On April 13, 2021, Council passed the Operating and Capital Budget and three-year Operating Plan, resulting in a tax decrease of **1.65** per cent.

The 2021 Budget reflects Town Council's continued commitment to support the community during the current challenging and uncertain times due to COVID -19.

In the 2021 Operating Budget, taxation revenue has been decreased by 1.69% for residential and 1.51% for the non-residential as compared with the 2020 taxation rates.

Retaining core service delivery to residents and completing operational projects will be a key focus in 2021. Council also prioritized the following areas of concern that were identified by ratepayers as part of the 2021 Budget Survey:

INFRASTRUCTURE IMPROVEMENTS

Road & Sidewalk Maintenance: Minor sidewalk and asphalt road repairs will be ongoing throughout the construction season of 2021 with a continued focus on improvement of alley ways.

Major restorative road and sidewalk replacement will be identified through the 5-year capital plan.

COMMUNITY SAFETY

Policing costs have increased from 10% to 15% in 2021.

Police funding is <u>included in the municipal tax portion</u> and paid directly to the Province of Alberta. Please see page two for more details.

Your Municipal Tax Bill is comprised of three components:

Municipal Property Tax

Council determines the amount of money needed to operate the municipality. From this amount, sources of revenue other than property tax, such as user fees and provincial grants, are subtracted. The remainder is the amount of money the municipality needs to collect through property taxes in order to provide services for the year.

POLICING COSTS

Due to a change in provincial government policy in 2019, the Town pays for a portion of our rural policing costs. The provincial policing model came into effect April 2020.

Town of Lamont Policing Costs

2020: 10% **\$32,399** 2021: 15% est. **\$43,684**

Police funding is included in the municipal tax portion and paid directly to the Province.

The Province plans to incrementally increase the Town's contribution to 30% by 2023.

Education Property Tax

Education property taxes are determined by the Government of Alberta. Muncipalities must contribute toward the public education system by collecting the education property tax from ratepayers.

The funds are then forwarded to the province to be added to the Alberta School Foundation Fund.

Seniors Foundation

The Town of Lamont receives a requisition from Lamont County Seniors Foundation which provides affordable housing.

The Town is required to collect these funds from municipal rate payers, similar to the education requisition.
